In 1987, I read every article I could find about this investigation. I was just a young adult myself, but I couldn't shake the horror — the brutal death of a 6-year-old girl, tortured by the very people who were supposed to protect her. Her name was Lisa Steinberg, though to me and many others, she will always be simply “Lisa.”

What haunted me most wasn't just what happened behind closed doors. It was that Lisa went to school almost every day. She sat in a classroom, surrounded by adults who should have noticed. Her teacher even testified that Lisa often arrived smelling of urine, dirty, with matted hair. But no one stepped in.
No one saved her.

Even as a child, I couldn't understand why no one helped her. I couldn't stop thinking about her for years. I knew, deep in my soul, that I wanted to be someone who would never turn away. Someone who would notice. Someone who would act.

At first, I thought the answer was to become a police officer. When I shared that plan with my mother and explained why, she looked at me and said,
“If you want to help children, become a teacher.”
And so, I did.

Now, 30 years later, I look back on a career spent exactly where I needed to be. I have helped hundreds of children, not just academically, but emotionally. Whether they needed support, guidance, or just a little extra love, I was there. I am grateful I never had to rescue a “Lisa.” But for 30 years, I have protected and advocated for children every single day. I have watched them grow, learn, and feel safe in my classroom. That is my legacy.

And I leave this profession fulfilled, knowing that Lisa's story, though tragic, gave me purpose. And that purpose became my life's work.

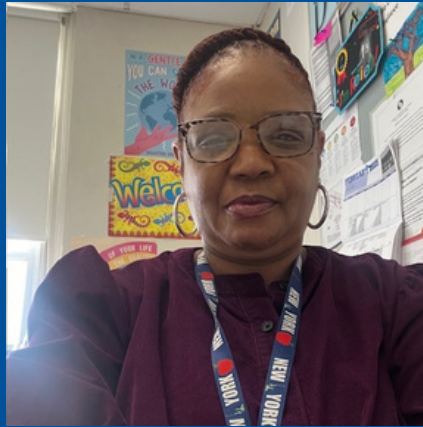
